China's manufacturing "overcapacity," fueled by government subsidies, is giving its companies an edge over the United States in Africa's transition to green energy, analysts say. W. Gyude Moore, senior fellow at the Center for Global Development, speaking at the Semafor World Economy Summit (WES) on Thursday, said that China's reported overcapacity — whereby its production capability significantly exceeds domestic demand — enabled its companies to offer competitive prices for green energy technologies in low-income countries. "If we're going to switch over to clean energy, are we going to use solar panels produced in Canada that are more expensive or the ones from China?," he posed. Semafor.

In January, the e-commerce marketplace Temu launched in South Africa, as the Chinese giant PDD Holdings begins its expansion into Africa. Pinduoduo is a third-party marketplace that connects buyers with sellers and has become known for offering heavily discounted consumer goods. Kenya second-hand clothes imports from China rise 86pc

The quantity of second-hand clothes imported from China, which is Kenya's main source of the popular low-cost used clothing, jumped by 86.2 per cent in the first quarter of this year signaling increased demand. Data from Chinese authorities shows the country exported 31,594 tonnes of second-hand clothing and accessories to Kenya between January and March 2024, valued at \$22.732 million (Ksh3.03 billion). In the first quarter of 2023, the value of second-hand clothes imported from China was \$20.651 million (Ksh2.768 billion) for 16,962 tonnes brought in. Second-hand clothes, which are commonly known as mitumba, are popular, especially among low and middle-income earners due to their low price compared to new clothes which are more expensive.
