

Rise of Chinese surveillance tech in Africa: Development or espionage?

Chinese technology companies like Huawei and ZTE are contributing to smart city development on the continent, but analysts warn that their tools provide authoritarian governments with the means to spy on citizens and promote repression. More than a dozen African countries – including Zimbabwe, Zambia, South Africa, Nigeria and Egypt – have deployed surveillance devices in recent years through cybersecurity and surveillance firms from countries including Israel, the UK and Germany. Chinese telecommunications giant Huawei and other Chinese firms have built roughly 70% of the 4G network infrastructure on the continent, according to the Africa Center for Strategic Studies 2020 report. Africa can learn from China about growing cities

Urban transition in many African states is quicker than China's but largely decoupled from industrialization. The economic growth paths of Asian and African countries have often been compared. China, with gross domestic product per capita of US\$251 in 1987, was poorer than most African countries at the time. Uganda's GDP per capita in US dollar terms that year was \$392, Zambia's \$319 and Ghana's \$354. Yet today China has GDP per capita of \$6,091 and it is the world's second largest economy. In Uganda, per capita GDP is still only US\$964. Asia and Africa have urbanized at similar speeds. Africa is undergoing the fastest urban transition the world has experienced to date with projections that nearly 1 billion more people will live in its cities by 2050. Earlier, China was in the top spot: between 1978 and 2010, over 700 million people moved to China's cities. The urbanization rates in Southeast Asia have been impressive as well and many of these nations have not even completed their urban transitions yet. Asia Times.

DR Congo state minister commends Chinese-built hydroelectric plant

Alexis Gisaro Muvuni, state minister for Infrastructure and Public Works of the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), said Thursday that he was impressed by the techniques witnessed at the Busanga hydroelectric plant in the southeastern province of Lualaba. The DRC and the Chinese side should further promote investment in electricity and infrastructure, and unleash the potential in hydroelectric and photovoltaic cooperation, said Muvuni at the Busanga hydroelectric plant. Lualaba Province is rich in mineral resources, notably copper and cobalt. In October 2023, DRC President Felix Tshisekedi inaugurated the Busanga hydroelectric plant by pressing the generator's main operating button in the control room, which marked the plant's electricity production start. The Busanga hydroelectric plant is jointly invested and built by China Railway Resources Group and Power Construction Corporation of China. It has an installed capacity of 240 megawatts, with an estimated average annual electricity production of 1.32 billion kWh. Xinhua.

Zambia says China's JCHX will invest \$300m in Lubambe copper mine

China's JCHX Mining plans to invest \$300 million to breathe new life into Zambia's Lubambe Copper Mines which it recently acquired, Zambia's state mining investment unit, ZCCM-IH said on Thursday. JCHX will invest in the Lubambe operations and extend the life of the copper mine, ZCCM-IH, the local partner, said. The Shanghai-listed mining services and contracting firm bought an 80% stake in Lubambe from EMR Capital. Lubambe Copper Mines did not immediately respond to a request for comment. The Zambia state firm, which owns the remaining 20% stake in Lubambe, said it will negotiate a new shareholders agreement and commercial terms with the Chinese company. Lubambe, previously owned by African Rainbow Minerals and Vale SA, produced about 15,000 tons of copper last year but needs to raise output to about 2,500 tons a month to become sustainable, it says on its website. China's economic influence more welcome in poorer countries, poll finds

Thailand holds most positive views of China, followed by Nigeria, Kenya and Tunisia, Pew survey shows. China's economic influence is felt everywhere around the world, but whether it is viewed in a positive or negative light depends greatly on each country's economic development, a survey of 35 countries has found. People living in high-income countries like the United States, Canada, Australia expressed broadly unfavourable views of China overall, with a median of 70 percent of people across 18 countries reporting negative feelings, according to polling released this week by the Pew Research Center. Those perceptions flipped in middle-income countries like Thailand, Kenya, and Bangladesh, with a median of 56 percent of respondents across 17 countries reporting favourable views, according to the Pew figures published on Tuesday.
