

#### Why China became more popular than US in Africa

A new Gallup poll indicates that China has outpaced the United States as the most influential power in Africa. Beijing's approval among Africans rose by six percentage points from 52 per cent in 2022 to 58 per cent in 2023. Besides, Washington's popularity fell from 59 per cent in 2022 to 56 per cent last year. This reflects a growing trend affirmed by other credible pollsters like Afrobarometer and Ichikowitz Family Foundation, which both rank China above the US in the popularity index. Nation.

## China in Africa: growing backlash against 'racism', economic exploitation

A recent opinion poll found that China is now more popular in Africa than the United States. Yet, this popularity apparently goes hand in hand with a backlash the Chinese face in a growing number of African countries, with many accusing them of "malicious" behavior. According to a recent Gallup polling, 58% of respondents in Africa approve of China versus 56% for the US. While China generally continues to remain popular amongst Africans, for years, however, many have speculated about China's real intentions on the African continent. Several cases of perceived Chinese "malicious" behavior have recently made headlines across Africa. A video claiming to show a Chinese man whipping African workers has gained massive traction on social media, though this is not the first time that such incidents have been reported. In April last year, a similar report highlighted the ill-treatment of African workers by Chinese project managers. This has prompted a heated debate among viewers on how the Chinese treat the Africans like 'trans-Atlantic slaves', leading some to express the view that the former are 'far more racist than the White man' in Africa. ## Congo's \$7 Billion Deal With China Linked to Copper Price Under New Contract

A revamped minerals-for-infrastructure deal between the Democratic Republic of Congo and China that will send billions of dollars in financing to the Central African nation is contingent on the price of copper, according to a newly published contract. Congo signed an updated agreement in March to its 2008 deal to trade copper and cobalt from a joint mining venture known as Sicomines for development funding. Under the new contract published on May 3, Congo will get \$324 million annually for infrastructure projects from its Chinese partners through 2040 as long as the copper price remains above \$8,000 per ton.
