"There are parts of Africa that are economically advancing like Kenya and South Africa, but there are also over 20 nations that are living in the horrors of war," Youssef said. China Daily.

He said both countries are deeply concerned about the current situation in Syria, and called for respect for the nation's sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity. Gotion to set up battery plants in Morocco, Slovakia

Gotion High-tech, a Volkswagen-backed Chinese battery maker, announced bold plans to establish advanced battery manufacturing facilities in Morocco and Slovakia, according to the company's announcements on Thursday. With a combined investment of approximately 2.514 billion euros (\$2.6 billion), the move signals Gotion's commitment to expanding its international presence in the fast-growing electric vehicle market. In Morocco, Gotion plans to invest up to 1.28 billion euros to build a 20 GWh-capacity plant, following the Moroccan government's endorsement and the signing of an investment agreement in June.
