In the sprawling Kakuma refugee camp, in northwestern Kenya, one section stands out because it is well-lit amid the tranquility of the looming dusk. The residents of Kakuma Three refugee camp are beneficiaries of green energy that is readily available thanks to a mini-grid that has been made possible thanks to China's solar technology. Vasco Hamisi, who fled the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) in 2010, is playing a pivotal role in ensuring that the Kakuma refugee camp has access to renewable energy despite not being connected to Kenya's main electricity grid. Hamisi, a father of two children, was inspired by the region's all-year-round abundant sunshine. Initially, he did not have the funding to actualize his dream of lighting up his camp, home to about 288,000 refugees from nine countries, including South Sudan, Ethiopia, Burundi and the DRC. Italy blocks shipment of Chinese drones bound for Haftar

Italian authorities have intercepted Chinese Wing Loong military drones at the port of Gioia Tauro, intended for the forces of Libyan warlord Khalifa Haftar. According to "The Times," Italian police detained three containers loaded with weapons on June 18, offloaded from the cargo ship MSC Arena, which had arrived from China. The publisher reported that a second suspicious shipment, consisting of more than three containers, was seized this past weekend aboard the MSC Apolline. The drones, along with two control stations, were meant to be shipped to Benghazi, Libya, for delivery to Haftar. The containers were seized by order of a local judge in Italy. The operation follows the indictment of two Libyans in Canada, Fathi Mahouk and Mahmoud Al-Sayeh, in April for conspiring to purchase Chinese drones for Haftar in exchange for Libyan oil shipments. Congo's Gecamines Opposes Deal for Trafigura-Backed Miner

Gecamines leases Mutoshi copper cobalt permit to Chemaf. Chemaf says Congo's government has approved the deal. Democratic Republic of Congo's state-owned miner Gecamines said it will oppose the sale of Trafigura Group-backed miner Chemaf Resources Ltd. to China's Norin Mining Ltd. Chemaf leases the permit for its flagship Mutoshi project from Gecamines, which said in a statement Monday that it has the right to reject the ownership transfer. Chemaf said in response that Congo's government has approved the transaction. Bloomberg.

Chinese firm to expand Rundu water treatment plant in Namibia

China Civil Engineering Construction Corporation (CCECC) will assist Namibia in constructing a 665 million Namibian dollars (about 37 million U.S. dollars) project to expand the Rundu water treatment plant in northern Namibia. The groundbreaking event took place on Monday in Rundu in Kavango Region, over 500 km from the country's capital, Windhoek. The project aims to enhance water security and support socio-economic development in the Kavango East and Kavango West regions, which have seen population growth due to rural

and urban migration. Namibian Minister of Agriculture, Water and Land Reform Carl Schlettwein said "as the town expands and the population grows, the strain on our existing systems intensifies. We must act decisively to address these issues." Funded by a loan from the African Development Bank, the project is part of Namibia's water sector support program. It includes the construction of a purification plant with a capacity of 36,000 cubic meters per day, expandable to 72,000 cubic meters in the future. Xinhua.

Chinese investment can help Comoros achieve food security amid climate crisis: president

The archipelago nation of Comoros needs improve its self-sufficiency as it bears the brunt of the climate crisis, according to its president Azali Assoumani. Comoros, a string of islands in the Indian Ocean, faces significant climatic adversities, which regularly disrupt agricultural activities, exacerbating the risk of food shortages and heightening the country's dependence on imported goods. Currently, over 60 percent of the nation's food supply is sourced externally, a vulnerability that Assoumani said he wanted to address through enhanced domestic agricultural productivity with the help of overseas investment. "We experience floods, cyclones, rising waters, droughts. These are times when people can't work. So, in terms of food, we must have something to store," Assoumani said at the Crans Montana Forum in Brussels. "The population needs the minimum to live in order not to be exposed to famine, to shortages," he added, saying his government was encouraging foreign partners including China to come to the country and invest in the sector.
