Ndoumale Village in south Cameroon used to remind people of virtually everything except for development. Located on the outskirts of the seaside resort city of Kribi, the once-inaccessible village now boosts revival thanks to the implementation of China-Africa cooperation projects. The village's transformation began in 2011 when China Harbor Engineering Company Ltd. (CHEC), a Chinese firm, began building the first phase of Kribi Deep Seaport about 25 km from the village. At the same time, Chinese construction company CGCOC Cameroon Ltd. set out to construct a drinking water treatment plant and related supporting facilities in Ndoumale, which can produce 7,000 cubic meters of water per day. Upon completion of the infrastructure, a new world of possibilities opened up, breathing new life into the village, which is inhabited by about 600 residents. Xinhua.

Reforms adopted at key CPC plenum significant to China, world -- S. African media leader

The third plenary session of the 20th Communist Party of China (CPC) Central Committee is "of great significance not just to China but to the world," a South African media leader has said. "China is one of the key countries and economies in the world today, therefore what the third plenary session of the 20th CPC Central Committee decides, the direction and guidance it gives to the Chinese economy, is of great significance not just to China but to the world," Iqbal Surve, chairman of South Africa's Independent Media, told Xinhua in a recent interview concerning the plenum held in Beijing on July 15-18. He noted that the reforms adopted at the plenum will also have a spillover effect on Africa and South Africa in particular, as it can serve as a blueprint for Africans to address the issues of poverty, inequality, and lack of innovation. "Our experience is that historically these sessions have been instrumental in defining China's social economic strategies," Surve said. "And this is very important at this point, because nobody would argue with you when you say that the world is at a very critical juncture right now." Xinhua.

Calligraphy connects China and Zimbabwe

At the "I Am Mbare" community school near the slums of Harare, the capital of Zimbabwe, over 30 children sat in neat rows in the small schoolyard. Their eyes were wide with curiosity as I unrolled my calligraphy work, displaying the Chinese characters "sheng sheng bu xi" — which literally translates to "live, live, never stop" — as my encouragement for the kids to grow and thrive. I read the words aloud and explained their meaning. I was impressed as the children excitedly tried to imitate me, showing their interest in my calligraphy and the Chinese language. The small yard was filled with their enthusiasm. This happened during a field trip I took from July 1 to 9 as part of the Tsinghua University Global Competency Overseas Practicum Course. The course sent four teams to various countries as part of a summer program in 2024, and I was selected as a member of the team visiting Zimbabwe. This small-scale, in-depth, handson course aims to cultivate students with a global vision and a Chinese stance, facilitating future people-to-people connections. China Daily.

Chinese aids Zimbabwe with 300 boreholes to fight drought

A total of 300 boreholes will be drilled in four provinces of Zimbabwe under a China-aided borehole drilling project launched Monday in Mahusekwa, a town in Mashonaland East Province. "The China-aided borehole drilling project is a symbol of cooperation, compassion, and unwavering support from our all-weather friend, the People's Republic of China, to ensure access to safe water for all Zimbabweans," said Garwe. Chinese President Xi Jinping, Togolese President Faure Gnassingbe and African Union Commission Chairperson Moussa Faki Mahamat on Tuesday, July 23, sent their congratulations to Paul Kagame upon his re-election as Rwandan President. They joined other leaders who sent their congratulatory messages to Kagame after he won the July 14-16 elections by a landslide, earning a five-year term. Kagame's 99 per cent election victory was confirmed as on Monday after the National Electoral Commission released the final results of the elections. According to Chinese news agency Xinhua, President Xi pointed out that Rwanda is a traditional friendly country of China, and that in recent years, China-Rwanda relations have developed rapidly, with fruitful results achieved in cooperation in various sectors and traditional friendship continuously deepening.
