# Energy connectivity, cooperation key to Africa's financial inclusion, experts say

The surge in digital financial tools in Africa through mobile phone connectivity has broadened financial access but is hindered by lack of access to affordable clean energy, experts who had gathered in Kenya's capital Nairobi said on Wednesday, adding that China-Africa cooperation can help bridge the continent's access-to-energy gap. Speaking during the China-Africa Digital Financial Inclusion Summit 2024, Bei Duoguang, president of the Chinese Academy of Financial Inclusion at Renmin University of China, said the focus in Africa should be covering the last mile in energy connectivity in order to bring people in far-flung areas into the financial systems. Bei cited the example of Kenya's M-Pesa virtual banking system, which is supported by the Huawei Mobile Money Platform as an innovative way, through which Africa uses digital technology to handle financial services. Security was not always a key priority in FOCAC Action plans, reflecting China's wider promotion of its "non-interference" principle and the fairly hands-off approach to economic cooperation during the early days of China's "Going Out" strategy. However, the watershed moment of the Libyan civil war and China's broader exposure to risk in intrastate conflicts in South Sudan and beyond led to the establishment of security cooperation as one key pillar of the FOCAC framework in 2012. WILLY BETT Kenyan Ambassador to China "When China started cooperating with Africa, the region started seeing meaningful development. Practical infrastructural development started happening. Most of the infrastructure you currently see in Africa is a result of the partnership between China and Africa, and it shows the perspective of China towards development and the philosophy of the leadership and the CPC in China – that development is a right of every human being. It's not the doing of a particular group, and so that is why China's ability came of age to

partner with other nations in the area of development. It became so practical. It became evident. We started feeling the presence of China in my country and Africa in general." CGTN.

## What Transsion tells us about Chinese investment in Africa

The Chinese firm Transsion Holdings is most well-known for smartphones only sold in African countries, including brand names Tecno, Itel and Infinix. Due to these brands, in the third quarter of 2023, Transsion surpassed Vivo to claim the fifth spot globally in mobile phone shipments, with its global market share reaching 8.6% and an African market share of around 40%. But Transsion's story is deeper than smartphones, and its story provides invaluable insights around the likely shape of Chinese foreign investment in Africa going forwards as well as lessons for other foreign investors looking to succeed in Africa. Crucial to Transsion's initial success was its ability to adapt to the ever-evolving dynamics of the global mobile phone landscape. African Business.

#### China And Africa Strengthen Television Program Exchanges

China and Africa are strengthening their collaboration in audiovisual production, with a focus on increasing exchanges of television series and programs. This was highlighted during the 6th Forum on China-Africa Media Cooperation and China-Africa Think Tank High-level Dialogue in Beijing. Representatives from government, radio and TV stations, as well as experts, expressed expectations for enhanced cooperation. The National Radio and Television Administration of China reported that by the end of last year, 237 audiovisual works and 180 agricultural programs had been translated into seven languages and broadcast in Africa. Cao Shumin, the administration's director, announced that China has signed agreements with 28 African countries to bolster cooperation in radio, television, and film. Broadcast Media Africa.
