

Learning Through Lending: China-Africa Economic Engagement through FOCACs Past and Present

As the 2024 Summit of the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC) approaches, it is warranted to look back at the trajectory of China-African economic engagement and assess its current state. For China, FOCAC, in its early years, provided a platform for assembling the ideological foundation of its growing ties with Africa while promoting policies that matched China's needs as a growing economy with opportunities in Africa. However, pledges and rhetoric at the last two FOCACs reflect the realization that Chinese and African needs and objectives do not reach perfect equilibrium without intervention and correction. Chinese and African officials have identified fundamental deficiencies in their previous modes of economic engagement, and actions taken in recent years exemplify the political will necessary to implement changes. African talents flourish through China collaboration

In 2023, Jamlick Mwangi Kariuki decided to return to China to continue his studies after earning a bachelor's degree at Beijing Jiaotong University in 2021. In the years between, Kariuki worked as an assistant engineer in his home country, Kenya. His responsibilities ranged from inspecting tracks on the Mombasa-Nairobi Standard Gauge Railway (SGR), a flagship project of the China-proposed Belt and Road Initiative, to planning, railroad management and operation. However, a hunger for more expertise and knowledge drove him back to the same university in Beijing, where he is currently enrolled in a master's degree in civil engineering. The 26-year-old Kenyan is just one of the more than 50,000 African students studying in China each year. China has become a preferred study destination for many young Africans, according to Hu Changchun, head of the Chinese mission to the African Union, CGTN.

China and Africa deepen infrastructure cooperation

Infrastructure is a cornerstone of China-Africa economic and trade collaboration. China supports Africa's focus on infrastructure development as a key strategy for economic revitalization and encourages Chinese companies to engage in Africa's infrastructure construction, investment and management through various models. TO jog your memory, Michael Renov a professor of critical studies at the USC School of Cinema-Television in 993, in his theorising about documentary forms made a distinction between four fundamental functions of documentary films: to record, reveal and preserve; to persuade or promote; to analyse and interrogate; and to express. In his school of thought, he had it that a documentary film is one of the greatest ways of helping people understand reality on the ground, because when one is able to see the people involved in such a film, it lends a certain immediacy and understanding that is hard to get on the page. That was also remarked by an American writer and journalist Lawrence Wright, emphasising that the visual medium of film has a profound impact on human connection and empathy. By showcasing real people and their stories through a documentary lens, viewers are able to witness the experiences, emotions and perspectives of individuals in a way that transcends written words on a page.
