Ramaphosa, Akufo-Addo, Ruto... African leaders head to China for FOCAC

Next month's Forum on China-Africa Cooperation is a hot ticket for African leaders, who hope to strengthen their economic ties with China. After a 2021 edition in Dakar, marked by the Covid-19 crisis, African heads of state, senior ministers and business leaders will be meeting in Beijing from 4 to 6 September for the ninth Forum for China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC). The theme of this year's summit, which is held every three years alternately in China and Africa, is 'Joining forces to promote modernisation and build a high-level China-Africa community of shared future'. African presidents have responded to the invitation en masse. Ghana's President Akufo-Addo will be coming to FOCAC as president for the last time. Akufo-Addo commissioned a Chinese-built refinery in January and has been glowing in recent praise for the Chinese negotiator Lu Kun for his role in helping Ghana negotiate with official creditors, including China, in the latest debt deal. China-Africa cooperation boosts continent's green transition

The green economy is a cornerstone of Africa's future development, and collaboration between China and Africa in this sector will play a crucial role in facilitating Africa's green transition, experts said. "Energy shortages have long been a challenge for Africa, and the continent is among the most vulnerable to climate change globally. As a result, Africa places significant emphasis on the development of renewable energy," said Zhang Chunyu, an associate researcher at the Institute of West-Asian and African Studies at the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences. According to the African Union's Agenda 2063, the share of renewable energy in total energy production across the continent is expected to surpass 50 percent by 2063. Zhang pointed out that Africa's green development is still in its early stages and lacks the necessary funding and technical support. China Daily.

Financing model in Africa bears fruit over 10 years

It's no secret that 2024 is a pivotal year for China-Africa relations, with the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation just days away. However, the FOCAC isn't the only significant milestone of 2024 — as the Africa Growing Together Fund, a joint effort of the African Development Bank and the People's Bank of China, turns 10 years old this year. Created in 2014, the AGTF, a \$2 billion cofinancing fund that finances sovereign and nonsovereign projects in Africa, became the cornerstone of AfDB's engagement with China, which dates back to 1985. Spanning a 10-year investment period that ends in November this year, the AGTF is a symbolic multilateral approach that is a welcome departure from China's usual practice of bilateral agreements on the African continent. So, what exactly has the AGTF achieved over the last decade? According to the most recent figures available online, there are currently 41 ongoing projects and six approved projects with Nigeria, Tanzania, and Egypt being the biggest recipients of funding and transportation, water supply, agriculture and rural development sectors benefiting the most. Sudan's Burhan to meet China's Xi, African leaders at Beijing summit

Sudan's military leader Abdel Fattah al-Burhan will hold talks with Chinese President Xi Jinping and several African leaders next week during a summit in Beijing, Sudan's acting foreign minister said on Tuesday. Burhan will attend the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC) summit scheduled for Sept. 2-6, Hussein Ali Awad told reporters. "Burhan is set to have discussions with the Chinese president on the sidelines of the summit and will also meet a number of African leaders," Awad said. He added that Burhan's presence at the summit offered a chance to address Sudan's issues with Beijing and to stress the importance of China's role in post-conflict Sudan, given the strong ties between the two countries. The FOCAC summit will also provide a platform for discussing issues important to Sudan with other participating leaders, Awad said. Sudan Tribune.
