FOCAC is an official forum between China and all states in Africa with the exception of the Kingdom of Eswatini. The trip will mark Ruto's first trip overseas since the country was hit by a wave of protests by the Gen Zs. President William Ruto is set to fly out to Beijing on Sunday evening for China for the ninth Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC). 5 key Chinese 'Belt and Road' projects underway in Africa

hina has vowed to beef up its vast Belt and Road global infrastructure initiative, promising "high-quality cooperation" ahead of a summit with African leaders in Beijing starting Wednesday. Africa is already a key Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) region, with Chinese companies signing contracts there worth more than \$700 billion between 2013 and 2023, according to Beijing's commerce ministry.
