President Xi Jinping announced a commitment to enhance China's support for debt-stricken Africa, pledging nearly \$51 billion in funding over the next three years, alongside support for additional infrastructure projects and the creation of at least 1 million jobs. Speaking to delegates from over 50 African nations gathered in Beijing for the triannual Forum on China-Africa Cooperation Summit, Xi expressed China's readiness to bolster cooperation

in industry, agriculture, infrastructure, trade, and investment. "China and Africa account for one-third of the world population. Without our modernization, there will be no global modernization," Xi stated. As the world's largest bilateral lender, China committed to executing three times as many infrastructure projects across resource-rich Africa, despite Xi's expressed preference for "small and beautiful" initiatives centered around the sale of advanced and green technologies, where Chinese firms have heavily invested. China's move to raise its statutory retirement age is a proactive and effective measure tackling the challenge of population aging, according to guest speakers at the China Economic Roundtable, an all-media talk platform hosted by Xinhua News Agency. According to a decision adopted by Chinese lawmakers on Friday, the statutory

retirement age will be gradually raised from 60 to 63 for men over the course of 15 years from 2025, from 55 to 58 for women working as cadres, and from 50 to 55 for women who are blue-collar workers. China's current statutory retirement age was set in the 1950s and has remained unchanged for more than seven decades. Over the years, profound changes have been seen in the country's average life expectancy, health conditions, demographic structure, education level, and relationship between labor supply and demand, Qi Tao, an official of the Ministry of Human Resources and Social Security, said at the roundtable. One-China Policy: Chinese ambassador Wu Peng salutes South Africa for championing China unification

Ambassador of the People's Republic of South Africa, Wu Peng has commended the South African government for championing the One-China Policy which was reiterated by President Cyril Ramaphosa during his recent two-legged trip to Beijing. IOL reported earlier this month that during his Beijing tour, Ramaphosa repeatedly emphasized that the Government of National Unity formed after the May 29 general elections does not "dilute" Pretoria's long-held position which assets that that there is only one sovereign State under the name China, with the People's Republic of China's serving as the sole legitimate government of that China, and Taiwan as an inalienable part of China. Ramaphosa invited several high-ranking Cabinet ministers on his Beijing tour, including Agriculture Minister John Steenhuisen who is also leader of the Democratic Alliance, to accompany him on the State Visit to China, and the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC) summit. Sudan army chief Burhan seeks political legitimacy on the back of damaging war

Sudan's military leader Abdel Fattah al-Burhan is seeing September, again, as a lucky month to market himself to the global audience as the legitimate leader of his country. It comes even as the ongoing war churns out a king-size humanitarian crisis. Last week, Burhan travelled to Beijing where he met with President Xi Jinping. The occasion was the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (Focac) where dozens of African leaders including Ethiopia's Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed and Kenya's President William Ruto gathered. But it was a personal triumph for a man who was forced to relocate from the country's capital Khartoum to Port Sudan, from where he has tried to defend his fort. In Beijing, discussions with Xi didn't amount to much but a photo of him and China's assurances on Sudan sovereignty were significant. China is ready to work with Sudan to promote the steady development of their strategic partnership, Xi said, according to an official dispatch from Beijing. Xi said China supports Sudan in "safeguarding national sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity, and hopes Sudan will restore peace and stability at an early date." The East African.
