Nations throughout Africa continue to experience a surge in debt obligations to China, which are laden with terms and conditions that are highly disadvantageous to the borrowers. # Trips to Africa gain increasing popularity among Chinese tourists.

By virtue of its unique natural landscapes, cultural charm, and diverse tourism experiences, Africa has become a hot tourist destination for Chinese tourists. In recent years, there has been a continuous increase in the number of Chinese tourists visiting the continent. Data from Chinese online travel service platform Ctrip show that from February to August this year, the number of Chinese tourists traveling to Africa has increased by about 1.2 times compared to the same period last year. Statistics from Fliggy, another major online travel service platform in China, indicate that the booking volume for flights to Africa this year has nearly doubled compared to the same period last year, with flights to Egypt and Kenya experiencing the fastest growth rates of 236 percent and 167 percent, respectively. An executive from Chinese online travel agency LY.com said that the average number of tourists traveling to Egypt per month between January and August this year increased by 200 percent compared to the same period last year. # IMF official: China-Africa cooperation contributes to Africa's modernization drive

The 2024 Summit of the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation was held in Beijing from Sept. 4 to 6. In a written interview with People's Daily Online, Steven Alan Barnett, IMF's senior resident representative in China, lauded the fruitful results of China-Africa trade cooperation and said that China's development experience will be conducive to Africa's high-quality development. China is the largest investor in Africa among developing countries and has been the continent's leading trade partner for 15 successive years. According to statistics from the General Administration of Customs, from 2000 to 2023, trade between China and Africa skyrocketed from less than 100 billion yuan (\$14.05 billion) to 1.98 trillion yuan, registering a 17.2 percent annual increase on average, exceeding the 4.6 percent annual average growth of China's trade in goods in the same period. China has become an increasingly important partner in Africa's development over the last few decades. The strong economic and financial ties that have developed between Africa and China over the last decades will foster the continent's further development in the period ahead, said Barnett. # China's J-10C, India's LCA Tejas 'Lock Missiles' For Egypt Deal; Report Says Cairo Keen To Explore IAF Fighters

J-10C was one of the star attractions at the international air show in Egypt earlier in September. Following the show, reports spiraled that Egypt had finalized or was looking to finalize J-10s for its force. Images of the Chinese-manufactured Y-20 transporter trailed by six J-10 jets flying over Egypt's Giza pyramids in formation last

week drew global attention, demonstrating distance and performance capabilities in the 10,000-kilometer flight from China to Egypt. Pakistan was the first buyer of the J-10s, which were considered to be more advanced than the JF-17s. A high-level Egyptian delegation visited the Hindustan Aeronautics Limited (HAL) facilities. By mid-September, the delegation will be in India and learn about Tejas, which will be equipped with Indian weapons in the future. Talks have been ongoing for a year. Cairo could opt for LCA Mk1A, the latest iteration of India's indigenous fighter jet. Egypt is considering procuring about 18 Tejas Mk1A aircraft from India. If the sale of Tejas goes through, it will also include a maintenance, research, and overhaul (MRO) facility in Egypt. EurAsian Times.

China has been Tanzania's largest trading partner for eight consecutive years. Last year, bilateral trade volume of goods reached \$8.78 billion, marking an 8.9 percent year-on-year increase, according to China's Ministry of Foreign Affairs. China Daily.
