Morocco, China to bolster cooperation on water resources management

Morocco and China signed, on Wednesday in Rabat, a memorandum of understanding establishing an executive program for cooperation in the field of water resources, covering the period 2025-2027. The executive program provides for exchange of experiences, strengthening human and institutional capacities, drafting cooperation projects, and coordinating the implementation of special training programs in the water sector. The areas of cooperation covered by this program comprise water infrastructure, including the construction, operation, management, and maintenance of water distribution projects. The program also covers the management of extreme phenomena such as floods and drought, the supply of drinking water in rural areas, and the conservation and protection of water resources, including saving water for irrigation.
