China's defense technologies shine at Africa's largest airshow

China's leading defense equipment displayed at the 2024 Africa Aerospace and Defence Exhibition (AAD) grabbed the spotlight in South Africa, attracting delegations from various countries. The 2024 AAD, Africa's largest airshow, kicked off on Wednesday at an air force base near Pretoria, South Africa's administrative capital. Chinese enterprises participating in the air show displayed China's star products in the fields of armored assault, fire strike, air defense and anti-missile, intelligent ammunition, unmanned and anti-unmanned systems through models and multimedia. On the first day of the air show, South African Defense Minister Angie Motshekga visited the exhibition area of Chinese defense enterprises. "For me, it's very interesting to show the world that war or defense has really become highly technical, it has become highly scientific. And therefore, of any relevance, you have to move quicker on science and technology," said Motshekga. Africa News.

China's mediation diplomacy hits a roadblock in Africa

China's Global Security Initiative (GSI), launched in April 2022, signals a clear break from the country's traditional non-interference policy and reflects its aspiration to be a global security provider. But as China stumbles to protect its multi-billion-dollar investments in Africa, this may dampen Beijing's increasingly assertive image. Successful mediation of the conflict in West Africa's Sahel region will be a crucial test of Beijing's diplomatic efforts in Africa. In early 2024, China National Petroleum Corporation (CNPC) completed a massive 2000-kilometre pipeline connecting Agadem in eastern Niger to the port city of Seme-Kpodj in Benin, aiming to produce 90,000 barrels of oil per day. This is over fourfold what Niger currently produces for its domestic market and would significantly increase the country's oil exports. The pipeline was scheduled to open by 2021, but the pandemic and regional instabilities delayed this by almost three years. The July 2023 military coup in Niger resulted in severe sanctions from the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS). East Asia Forum.

Under the strategic guidance of the two Heads of State, China-Zambia relations have reached a new level. It was hoped that the two countries take the opportunity of the establishment of sister province relationship between Jiangxi Province and Central Province to further promote cooperation in various fields within the framework of FOCAC. Minister Nkurukusa said that Zambia and China have enjoyed a profound traditional friendship and thanked China for its long-term support for Zambia Zawya.

Zambia praises China's support in fighting cholera

Zambia has praised China for its swift response in helping the country combat a cholera outbreak that began in October last year and continued into the first quarter of 2024. Kennedy Lishimpi, permanent secretary in charge of technical services in the Ministry of Health, said China's response enabled the government to respond swiftly to improve water supplies in cholera-prone areas through donations of water tanks, among other support. "China assisted Zambia in terms of making sure that our community responses were done properly. We had the tanks that we needed to make sure water was available to the citizens, and they also supported the availability of different medicines," he said in a recent interview with Xinhua. Lishimpi also said the government has asked a Chinese company to help produce oral cholera vaccines in preparation for the coming rainy season when the country is prone to cholera outbreaks. The two parties were in the final stages of discussions on the production of the vaccines. Xinhua.
