

Forum on China-Africa Cooperation evades contradictions at the end of the Belt and Road: Chinese investment, finance and trade controversies in Southern Africa

The Forum on China-Africa Cooperation summit in early September follows a markedly unsuccessful Dakar FOCAC in 2021 (where Chinese investment commitments dropped radically), in turn following overhyped events in Beijing in 2018 and Johannesburg in 2015. To be sure, there are several current processes of importance, all deserving detailed analysis (beyond the scope of this paper): the Nine Programs, 2022-24 Dakar Action Plan, China-Africa Cooperation Vision 2035, and the Declaration on China-Africa Cooperation on Combating Climate Change. But the main problem continues to arise and does not appear to be resolvable within FOCAC: the super-exploitative character of investment, finance and trade by Chinese capitalists in Africa, especially Southern Africa's extractive industries. Why China's sea-rail transport link plan for Africa is an echo of the 'Hunan model'

Proposed network connecting to Africa and Beijing's language around it are straight from 'Hunan model' playbook, observer says. China is on a mission to recreate the ancient Silk Road to East Africa – through air, railroad and sea links under its Belt and Road Initiative. Beijing is also increasingly promoting the interconnected development of transport links and industrial parks built and operated by Chinese companies in Africa. Its latest pledge involves a multimodal sea-rail transport network connecting Africa to China's central and western regions, under the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC) action plan issued earlier this month. The September 4-6 FOCAC summit in Beijing saw Chinese President Xi Jinping hold separate meetings on the sidelines with his counterparts William Ruto of Kenya and Tanzania's Samia Suluhu Hassan, as well as Ethiopian Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed. The talks focused on prioritising ports and rail connectivity projects for the coming network. South China Morning Post.

Chad denies reports on return of U.S. Special Forces

Chad on Saturday denied reports that it has agreed on the return of American Special Forces to the Central African nation. On Friday, American media, citing U.S. Major General Kenneth Ekman, reported that the United States and Chad had reached an understanding for the return of a limited number of Special Forces personnel. "No decision of this nature has been taken by the Chadian authorities," Chad's Foreign Minister Abderaman Koulamallah said in a statement. "It is important to remember that Chad, as a sovereign state, remains master of its decisions in matters of national security and military cooperation with its international partners," Koulamallah added. Nearly five months ago, the United States Department of Defense announced the withdrawal of its military presence from Chad. China Military.

74-year-old veteran from Republic of Congo regains sight on Chinese hospital ship

Ophthalmology experts aboard the Chinese naval hospital ship Peace Ark, which is carrying out the Mission Harmony-2024, successfully performed eye surgery on a 74-year-old veteran who was one of the first batch of students from the Republic of Congo to study in China. Mfoutou Antoine was once one of the first batch of military students from the Republic of Congo to study in China in 1970. He was then a 20-year-old navy soldier. When he finished his studies and prepared to return home, he was warmly received by Chairman Mao Zedong and Premier Zhou Enlai as one of the military students from the Republic of Congo. Recently, after Mfoutou Antoine came to the hospital ship Peace Ark for treatment, the Chinese ophthalmology experts conducted a number of special ophthalmic examinations on him, and successfully completed cataract phacoemulsification surgery for him.
