Two protocols signed between Uganda and China last month that allow the East African country to export dried chilies and wild aquatic products will contribute to the country's foreign exchange earnings, a senior official said Tuesday. Minister of Agriculture Frank Tumwebaze told reporters Tuesday that the two protocols were signed during the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC) Summit held in Beijing last month. According to the minister, one of the protocols addressed "the inspection, quarantine and sanitary requirements for wild aquatic

products, including Nile perch fillets, headless and gutted Nile perch, fish maw, fish skins, fish scales, and silverfish products to be exported from Uganda to China." Xinhua.

## Algeria closes the door to the BRICS

Algeria has decided not to join the BRICS group, as a result of a decision by the Algerian authorities in view of the political positions and membership criteria of the political and economic group of emerging countries. The BRICS group is a political and economic group founded in 2006 and named after the initials of its member states (Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa), although, as of 1 January 2024, Egypt, Iran, the United Arab Emirates, Saudi Arabia and Ethiopia will join the group, as announced at its 15th Summit, held in August 2023 in Johannesburg, South Africa. The entity is made up of emerging nations that constitute an alternative pole to the G7, made up of the world's most developed economies, with the challenge of being an alternative space to the great powers and being an opposition to the established economic order through entities such as the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank. ## Zimbabwe's Lithium Dreams Hit Roadblocks Despite Chinese Investments

Bikita Minerals, run by China's Sinomine Resource Group, is struggling with Zimbabwe's infrastructure and policy issues as lithium prices slump. Lithium prices have nosedived from their 2022 highs due to oversupply and weaker-than-expected EV battery demand. This decline has led to production cuts and job losses in Zimbabwe's mining sector. Despite significant investments by Chinese firms like Sinomine, Zhejiang Huayou Cobalt, and Chengxin Lithium Group – totaling over \$1 billion since 2021 – operational risks in Zimbabwe are mounting. Issues such as unreliable power, capital constraints, and foreign currency problems are hitting hard. Additionally, inconsistent government policies on licensing, taxation, and export regulations complicate these challenges. A Zimbabwean rule forcing exporters to convert 25% of their hard currency to the depreciating local currency further exacerbates losses for miners. Finimize.
