#### Zambia Partners with China on First Cholera Vaccine Plant

Zambia has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with China to establish its first cholera vaccine manufacturing facility, a significant step in combating the disease that has adversely affected the southern African country. Announced in Lusaka, the project will be developed via a partnership between Zambia's Industrial Development Corporation (IDC) and China's Jijia International Medical Technology Corporation. The facility, with an initial phase costing \$37 million, aims to produce approximately three million doses annually. Zambian President Hakainde Hichilema emphasized the project's importance, stating it could position Zambia as a manufacturing hub for Africa, which is experiencing rapid population growth.
