China's language diplomacy in Papua New Guinea

As China extends its global influence, Papua New Guinea, the largest Pacific Island nation, has become a significant focus. Beyond roads, bridges, and ports under the Belt and Road Initiative, China is also venturing into the realm of cultural and educational exchanges, where Chinese language programs serve as key instruments of soft power. By promoting Mandarin language education, China aims to create a foundation for long-term people-to-people ties, potentially fostering favourable public perceptions and closer diplomatic relations beyond transactional

economic relationships. The signing of a memorandum of understanding in 2017 paved the way for the establishment of Confucius Institutes and Chinese language centres at institutions such as the Papua New Guinea University of Technology in Lae and the University of Goroka in the Eastern Highlands province. China's critical mineral dominance puts Washington's supply chain hopes at risk

Beijing's dominance in the resource-rich central African nation Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) may complicate Washington's ambitions to de-risk its critical minerals from China's supply chains, according to new analysis. London-based minerals research and pricing firm Benchmark Mineral Intelligence said that most of the DRC's cobalt – a crucial component in electric vehicle batteries and other electronics – is already in the hands of mining companies from China. Chinese companies control two-thirds of cobalt in the DRC, which accounts for an estimated 74 per cent of global output, putting it at a "high risk" of falling foul of the foreign entity clause in the US Inflation Reduction Act (IRA). Fourth China-aided school handed over to Botswana

The fourth China-aided primary school was officially handed over to Botswana on Sunday. Ramaeba Primary School, located in Kazungula village in northern Botswana, is designed to accommodate 560 students across 14 classrooms, spanning about 61,000 square meters. The school's main facilities include 16 buildings, such as teaching and office blocks, a library, a dining hall, teachers' dormitory, and sports fields. "China has taken to its notice that education is among the top priorities of Botswana's socio-economic development process," said Fan Yong, China's ambassador to Botswana. Xinhua.
