S Africa launches scheme to woo tourists from India, China to boost jobs

South Africa has launched an innovative new scheme to increase tourism, especially from India and China, inviting tour operators from those two countries to join their local counterparts in signing up to the scheme. Two months after Minister of Home Affairs, Dr Leon Schreiber, conceptualised the concept, his Department on Tuesday announced the Trusted Tour Operator Scheme (TTOS), which is aimed at enhancing job creation that flows from increased tourism. This followed discussion with the tourism ministry and the tourism sector in the country to find ways of eliminating visa inefficiency and red tape which had throttled South Africa's ability to attract more tourists from these two burgeoning source markets. White House Backing Lobito Corridor to Challenge China's Influence in Africa

The US is stepping up its presence in Africa to counter China's growing influence on the continent, with the \$4 billion Lobito Corridor project in Angola at the center of its move. This major railway project aims to connect Angola's Port of Lobito to Zambia and the Democratic Republic of Congo, facilitating US and EU access to critical minerals like cobalt and copper needed for the energy transition. According to Amos Hochstein, the Special Presidential Coordinator for Global Infrastructure and Energy Security, the US strategy involves leveraging private investors and

multilateral funding for commercially viable, high-standard infrastructure projects in Africa. He contrasted this with China's approach which he claimed burdens developing countries with high debt. The US committed \$250 million to the project eighteen months ago and has since mobilized the \$4 billion needed to execute it. Africa.com LLC.

Tanzania's honey firm poised to access China's mega-market through 7th CIIE

Four employees of a honey processing company located at Goba, 18 kilometers north of Tanzania's port city of Dar es Salaam, are busy making final preparations for participation in the seventh edition of the China International Import Expo (CIIE), which will be held in Shanghai from Nov. 5 through Nov. 10. The company, which produces, processes, packages, and sells beekeeping products, is among the 34 Tanzanian exhibitors for this year's CIIE, where they will showcase a variety of goods, including honey, agricultural produce, textiles, minerals, handicrafts, and industrial goods. Mozambique: Exports to China up by 25.5% year-on-year in August

Exports from Portuguese-speaking countries to China have seen their best start to the year ever, reaching US\$97.6 billion, it was announced on Thursday. This is the highest figure for the period between January and August since the Forum for Economic and Trade Cooperation between China and Portuguese-speaking Countries (Macau Forum) began publishing this type of data from the Chinese Customs Service in 2013. Exports increased by 4.9% year-on-year, mainly due to the largest Portuguese-speaking supplier to the Chinese market, Brazil, whose sales grew by 5.2% to US\$81.5 billion, a new high for the first eight months of the year. Angola's sales of goods to China increased by 1.8% to US\$12 billion (\in 11.1 billion), while exports from Portugal rose by 11.4% to US\$2.09 billion. Club of Mozambique.
