China's ambassador to Kenya Zhou Pingjian is heading back to Beijing this month after a successful four year tenure. He is praised for significant contributions to strengthen bilateral ties between Kenya and China. Pingjian was Chinese ambassador to Nigeria until 2020 when he took up the post in Nairobi. He is the 17th since Kenya and China established diplomatic relations 61 years ago. Ambassador Pingjian took over from Wu Peng whose stay in Kenya ended just more than a year into his tour of duty. Biden's long-awaited Africa trip to tout a win against China

Joe Biden headed to Angola on Sunday for a trip that will deliver on a promise to visit Africa during his presidency and focus on a major U.S.-backed railway project that aims to divert critical minerals away from China. The project, partly funded with a U.S. loan, links the resource-rich Democratic Republic of

Congo and Zambia to the Angolan port of Lobito on the Atlantic Ocean, offering a fast and efficient route for exports to the West. At stake are vast supplies of minerals like copper and cobalt, which are found in Congo and are a key component of batteries and other electronics. China is the top player in Congo, which has become an increasing concern to Washington. Reuters.

U.S. Faces Stiff Test Against Chinese Dominance in Africa

Cristina Nambendi receives training on farming techniques from an American-funded program in Angola. But when asked if she had ever heard of President Biden or knew much about the United States, she looked stumped. When asked about China, however, her eyes lit up. "What I hear and what I see is that they are building tall buildings and houses, and they are selling stuff," said Ms. Nambendi, 47, who has been farming corn and beans for more than two decades in this southern African nation.
