Can China's zero-tariff market access boost African economic fortunes?

Thirty-three of Africa's "least-developed countries" (LDCs) are now able to export goods duty free into Chinese markets, but the policy is unlikely to have a significant impact since large commodities such as oil and minerals are already exported to China, according to a new analysis. The zero-tariff policy took effect this month, fulfilling a pledge made by Chinese President Xi Jinping at the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC) summit in September. Yahoo News.
