

Chinese FM's Africa tour is more than symbolic

The United States' outgoing President Joe Biden made his first visit to Africa in December, during the twilight of his term in office. In contrast, Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi has upheld a three decade-long tradition of making African nations the first entries on Beijing's diplomatic calendar. By the end of this week, Wang will have visited Namibia, the Republic of Congo, Chad and Nigeria. While it's never clear in advance where the Chinese delegation will stop — or indeed why — the visits "resonate in Africa as a reminder of China's consistent commitment to the continent, in contrast to the approaches of the US, United Kingdom and European Union," Eric Olander, co-founder of the China-Global South Project, a multimedia project that covers China's engagement in the Global South, told the Reuters news agency.
