The Red Sea is strategically important as 12 percent of global trade passes through it, and the presence of the Suez Canal at its northern end. The base in Sudan will help Russia compensate for losing its naval base in Tartus, Syria. With the instability in Syria, having a stable base in Sudan ensures that Russia maintains a strategic foothold in the region. Sudan's foreign minister confirmed the plan to proceed after years of delay. The announcement came during the minister's visit to Moscow, where he met his Russian counterpart, Sergei Lavrov. China, Morocco launch joint green energy lab

The Joint Laboratory of China-Morocco Green Energy and Advanced Materials was established in El Jadida, Morocco on Friday, aiming to promote the application of related technological achievements in Morocco and across Africa. The lab was jointly established by State Grid Xinjiang Electric Power Company, Xi'an University of Technology, Shandong University and Chouaib Doukkali University in Morocco. Although Morocco boasts abundant resources in solar and wind energy, renewable energy still represents a limited proportion of the overall energy structure and the pace of energy transition remains relatively slow, particularly facing challenges in infrastructure development and technology integration, according to a statement from the company.
