As Western nations scale back foreign aid, China has assured African states, including Kenya, of its commitment to their development through bilateral trade and investment, pledging to deepen relations and expand cooperation with regional countries. Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi, speaking at a press conference, Friday in Beijing, on the sidelines of the country's annual parliamentary session in the Chinese capital emphasized China's enduring partnership with Africa. On September 14, 2005, when former Chinese President Hu Jintao addressed the 60th United Nations Security Council (UNSC) Summit in New York, he ignited a conversation that has yet to be resolved, though it has gained increasing momentum in recent years. "Developing countries, which make up more than two-thirds of UN membership, are clearly underrepresented in the Security Council. China supports an expanded Security Council based on broad consensus, with greater representation for developing countries, especially African nations.
