China and Kenya announced they had upgraded ties to a "new level" on Thursday during a meeting between President Xi Jinping and Kenyan President William Ruto in Beijing, as they both pledged to create an "all-weather" China-Africa community. Xi said they had agreed to "lead the development of China-Africa relations and unity and cooperation of the Global South," according to a media pool report. Deals worth €750 million have already been secured from seven Chinese companies, aimed at boosting Kenya's manufacturing, agriculture and tourism sectors, according to Kenyan newspaper The Standard. Trade between China and Kenya is on the rise, with a reported 11.9 percent increase in the first quarter of 2025. China is Kenya's largest trading partner and top import source, while Kenya is China's biggest trade partner in East Africa. RFI.

In a statement on Thursday, April 24, Sing'Oei explained that President Ruto was addressing the challenges Kenyan products exported to China are facing because Kenya is not classified as a least developed country (LDC).
